Integration of governance and management is hampered by fragmentation in jurisdiction, policy, planning, and regulation. And while there are no shortage of innovative ideas, a lack of integration can mean a solution in one area causes greater hardship for another. For rural places, this situation is accompanied by very real capacity challenges, including burnout of volunteers and community leaders unable to keep up with multiple, separate requests for participation and engagement. This panel includes researchers from across water-related disciplines, including environmental and human uses, and qualitative and quantitative perspectives.
